Unity prevails over conflict

229. This principle, drawn from the Gospel, reminds us that Christ has made all things one in himself: heaven and earth, God and man, time and eternity, flesh and spirit, person and society. The sign of this unity and reconciliation of all things in him is peace. Christ "is our peace" (Eph 2:14). The Gospel message always begins with a greeting of peace, and peace at all times crowns and confirms the relations between the disciples. Peace is possible because the Lord has overcome the world and its constant conflict "by making peace through the blood of his cross" (Col 1:20). But if we look more closely at these biblical texts, we find that the locus of this reconciliation of differences is within ourselves, in our own lives, ever threatened as they are by fragmentation and breakdown.[183] If hearts are shattered in thousands of pieces, it is not easy to create authentic peace in society.

230. The message of peace is not about a negotiated settlement but rather the conviction that the unity brought by the Spirit can harmonize every diversity. It overcomes every conflict by creating a new and promising synthesis. Diversity is a beautiful thing when it can constantly enter into a process of reconciliation and seal a sort of cultural covenant resulting in a "reconciled diversity". As the bishops of the Congo have put it: "Our ethnic diversity is our wealth... It is only in unity, through conversion of hearts and reconciliation, that we will be able to help our country to develop on all levels".[184]

Kindy:

The children have enjoyed exploring their new classroom and making new friends.

Please keep in mind that we aim to build on small successes. We endeavour to praise each achievement, no matter how little. We will be discussing the topics 'All About Me' and 'Easter- New Life'. While social and emotional skills will be a priority, we will also focus on several concepts throughout the term. These will include 'Getting to know Jesus' and how to pray, counting skills to 10, one to one correspondence to 10, 2D shapes and their names, sorting and classifying, concepts of print, syllabification of words, learning Peggy Lego prompts, name recognition, listening skills and following instructions. We look forward to getting to know you and your child.

Pre Primary:

Welcome to a new year in Pre Primary! This term will be all about establishing rules and routines as the children settle into full time schooling. We will be focusing our learning around the theme 'Our Family' and 'All about Me'. Following on from this, we will be exploring Easter through discussions about New Life and the Easter story. We will also be introducing Making Jesus Real, a program that helps children see the God moments in everyday life and within their actions. We look forward to an exciting and busy term.

Year One:

Welcome to a new and exciting year in Year One! This term in Religious Education we will be exploring friendship, belonging and Easter.

In our Literacy sessions we will be practising our reading, writing and phonics as well as learning lots of new activities. This term in Numeracy we are working on addition, subtraction and measurement. We are looking forward to a busy and productive term!

Year Two:

Welcome to Year Two. We hope you had an enjoyable and relaxing holiday. This term we are learning about water and sustainability. You will be sure to see many fascinating sea creatures hanging in our colourful classrooms. As a part of our learning journey, the children will be taken on an excursion to AQWA on Friday, March 6th.

For Literacy we will be focusing on recount writing as well as a variety of reading strategies and listening skills. During Maths lessons we will be learning about place value, number stories, addition and subtraction. 'Loving Our Differences' and 'Just Like Jesus' are the two topics in Religion this term. We are looking forward to a wonderful term.

Year Three:

What a great start to the year it has been for our Year 3 students with the excitement of Edudance this term. This year, our Religious Education units begin with Loving Like Jesus and Speak From The Heart (Prayer) followed by our Lent/Easter unit. Our Numeracy focus is on Number and Place Value with an emphasis on consolidating and learning mental computation and problem solving strategies. Numeracy will be taught using interactive programs such as Mathletics and other hands-on resources to promote conceptual understanding.

In Literacy, we will be writing narratives and putting our powers of persuasion into practise while we prepare for NAPLAN in Term 2. We will continue to use Diana Rigg as our spelling program.

We are exploring Australia, its neighbouring countries and its natural features in SOSE while in Health we focus on Social Skills. We look forward to meeting you all and the excitement that Year Three will bring.

Year Four:

Welcome to the fantastic, fun-filled and fruitful world that is Year Four! 2015 will showcase a variety of engaging and challenging learning opportunities to further student's knowledge and understanding across all Key Learning Areas. The Term One Literacy writing focus is narratives, with students producing published products for their Pre-Primary buddies. Students will begin using the Lexile reading system and the interactive program, Reading Eggs, to participate in Dedicated Literacy Blocks every day. Mathematics will be taught using interactive programs such as Mathletics and other hands-on resources to promote conceptual understanding. Using Dedicated Numeracy Blocks the students will further their knowledge of place value and shape. A Mental Computation and Problem Solving focus will also be at the forefront of the mathematics curriculum in Year Four. In Religion the students will look at their relationship with God and how they can make this stronger and more meaningful as well as the relevance of Easter and Lent. Through our SOSE units, students will have the opportunity to study environments and conservation. We look forward to working with you all and the excitement that Year Four will bring.

Year Five:

It is going to be a very exciting term in Year Five with our assembly commencing straight away in Week 3, so stay tuned for some very important information regarding this. In Mathematics this term we will be honing in on our basic number skills, looking at addition, subtraction, multiplication and division as well as looking at 24 hour time, 3D shapes and angles. In Society and Environment we will become experts on North America and in Science we will be delving into the desert animals our world has to offer. English will see us preparing for NAPLAN in Term Two focussing on narratives and persuasive writing. We will be continuing to reflect on 'Making Jesus Real' and we are all looking forward to seeing this in action in our classrooms.

There is an exciting buzz around the area as we brace ourselves for what looks to be a very busy term in Year 6! Term 1 will also see us preparing ourselves to receive the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit through the Sacrament of Confirmation. Reading Recovery:

This year is the sixth year Reading Recovery has been in operation at Mater Christi. It comes under the banner of RAISe ie helping your child get a good start in literacy and numeracy with structured dedicated time in these areas.

Reading Recovery was developed as a result of extensive research into literacy education and the trailing of teaching procedures by Marie Clay, a professor of Education at the University of Auckland, New Zealand.

Reading Recovery is a research-based intervention with the prime goal of accelerating literacy learning for struggling students. Research evidence supports that Reading Recovery is a means of accelerating the development of early reading and writing than many other instruction interventions.

Reading Recovery provides early literacy intervention to promote reading and writing competency, by fostering a development of these skills. This is achieved by tailoring individualised lessons for each student, where the child receives intensive teaching for half an hour each day on a one-to-one basis, during school time for a 12 - 20 week period. Children's progress is tracked daily using a variety of means, that inform each day's lessons to maximise achievement and accelerate literacy learning.

Young children (Year 1) are best suited for the program because Reading Recovery relies on the teacher hearing what the children do with their reading to provide the most appropriate intervention before reading becomes a silent process. Early intervention is also important because the young brain can be rewired before neural networks become cemented.

P&F Meeting

Drama:

The junior focus for this term is "**Creative Play and using our Imagination**!" Play is exploratory, often without being clearly aware of the learning that is taking place. In their play, children take on roles, explore stories and experiment with sounds, patterns and movements. Their self esteem and confidence flourish in and through the Arts!

The senior focus is on "**Improvisation**", this stimulates the imagination and the spontaneity in the moment! The students will enjoy Drama games that develop confidence and a sense of fun. As well as this, the students will be encouraged to imagine, explore, create, and share in front of others.

In Drama, as you are aware, there is an ongoing focus on the children learning to become more **resilient.** Being resilient is the human capacity to bounce back from life's ups and downs and this can mean a variety of things to different children. We are using the <u>`Friendly</u> <u>Schools Plus'</u> as a teaching and learning resource, and its aim is to develop the student's social and emotional intelligence to enable them to:

- Recognize and control their emotions
- Build positive relationships
- Show consideration for others
- Make thoughtful and sensible choices
- Cope successfully with difficult situations.

Along with this, as a school our main empahasis is on "**Making Jesus Real**" (MJR). It is centred on the belief that we are the image of Jesus to all those around us. Therefore our actions should reflect His values but we do need to be switched on to recognise this. This is aimed at helping the students gain and maintain a positive attitude to life through assisting in the development of people skills.

Total Health – Occupational Therapy

Occupational Therapists from Total Health will replace Skillbuilders at Mater Christi this year. An occupational therapist from Total Health will visit the school every Tuesday. If there is a great enough demand then another day will be offered.

This service operates on a fee for service basis. If families have private health cover that covers occupational therapy, they may be able to claim some back. Having occupational therapy at school eliminates the need for travel and it also enables communication to occur between the therapist, parent and class teacher.

Assessment of kindergarten children will be held during Term 1, 2015, beginning week 4. Referrals for occupational therapy services at the school are accepted across all year groups.

Talk The Talk Speech Pathology

Therapists from Talk the Talk Speech Pathology will continue to visit Mater Christi throughout 2015. Talk the Talk is a private practice which has a long standing association with providing speech therapy services in schools. This year, two therapists will be visiting the school. Angela Turner will visit on a Tuesday; while Patricia Forbes will visit on a Friday.

This service operates on a fee for service basis. That is, parents book their child in for services directly with Talk the Talk, and an hourly rate is charged. If families have private health cover that covers speech pathology, they may be able to claim back some of these costs.

Having access to speech therapy at school reduces the travel time needed to take students to appointments outside of the school. It also means that regular communication can take place between the therapist and a child's class teacher.

Services that can be provided include assessment and therapy for the following areas:

- Speech sound development speaking clearly
- Language listening, understanding and expressing Ideas
- Early literacy development
